Order forms have been sent out. If you need retakes, send your packet in with your child, and make sure you keep the class picture. Sports/choir/band/twirling group pictures will be taken.



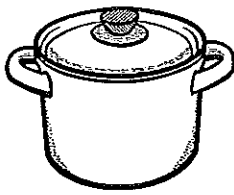

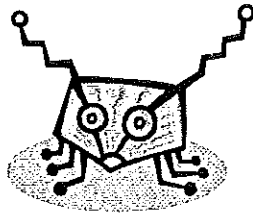
Lunch is available Monday – Friday for \$2.75; nutrition information available in the lunchroom.

Lice has been discovered in 2nd & 5th grade and K

- Head lice are transmitted mainly through close head-to-head contact.
- Children working or playing in small groups are all at risk.
- Head lice may also be transmitted by sharing personal items such as brushes, scarves, and hats.
- Parents, caregivers, and siblings may acquire head lice from younger children through sharing pillows, beds, towels, brushes, or combs.
- It is important to get rid of lice as soon as possible, so that other members of the family or close associates may avoid infestation.

Please check your child often over the next few weeks for signs of lice.

Symptoms may include:

Intense itching

Tickling feeling from movement of hair

Visible lice (they look like small light colored sesame seed sized bugs)

Nits (Lice eggs) that look like tiny white lumps at the base or near the base of the hair shaft that do not come off when you try to pull on them.

Small red bumps on the scalp, neck, and shoulders

For photos of what the lice and nits look like, please use Google Images to look up "Louse in hair" and "nits in hair"

If you suspect your child to have lice but you are not sure, please contact Ms. Allen at 775-6747 and ask her to check your child.

Our new policy: Students may return to school after they have had the proper lice treatment (Shampooed and combed using a lice kit) and there are no more live bugs in their hair. Be sure to do the follow-up shampooing as directed by the kit to prevent further infestations.

How to get rid of lice

If your child shares a room with another sibling please follow all steps for the other child too even if you do not see lice on the other child.

Step 1: Use a lice kit such as LiceMD, RID or Nix that comes with the lice pick (comb) and the shampoo. Buy extra shampoo for extra children. Be sure to follow the directions EXACTLY.

Step 2: Wash ALL bedding and linens where the child's head has been using the hot water setting on your washing machine. Wash all sheets, blankets, pillowcases, dirty laundry, hats and scarves that may have been used in the last 3 weeks. If the item should not be machine washed then please refer to step 3.

Step 3: Choose 4 or 5 outfits for the child to wear and put ALL of the other clothing into garbage bags and tie them. Keep the clothing in the bags for at least two weeks to be sure and kill any lice or nits that may be on them. This will include extra pillows, stuffed animals, clothing, couch throws, throw pillows, and jackets. EVERYTHING that the child's head may have been on or near needs to be washed.

Step 4: Vacuum the bare mattress(es) and the floor in the child's room. Also vacuum the family couch, upholstered chairs, and carpet where the child likes to play or has laid recently.

Step 5: Check all other family members for lice and keep checking over the next few weeks.



Strep Throat

We have had a case of strep throat in 2nd grade.

Symptoms

Children will usually get sick 3-5 days after exposure. Illness begins suddenly with fever, sore throat, headache & stomachache are common. The throat and tonsils are often swollen and beefy red. Strep will sometimes cause foul smelling breath.

How is it diagnosed?

A doctor will conduct a strep test.

How is it treated?

Antibiotics are often used to treat strep throat. Ibuprofen may be given for pain.

How can it be prevented?

Avoid close contact with contagious people. Children may return to school 24 hours after antibiotics have been started

Hand, Foot, and Mouth Disease (Coxsackievirus) Fact Sheet

Hand, foot, and mouth disease is caused by one of several types of viruses

Hand, foot, and mouth disease is usually characterized by tiny blisters on the inside of the mouth and the palms of the hands, fingers, soles of the feet. It is commonly caused by coxsackievirus A16 (an enterovirus), and less often by other types of viruses.

Anyone can get hand, foot, and mouth disease

Young children are primarily affected, but it may be seen in adults. Most cases occur in the summer and early fall. Outbreaks may occur among groups of children especially in child care centers or nursery schools. Symptoms usually appear 3 to 5 days after exposure.

Hand, foot, and mouth disease is usually spread through person-to-person contact

People can spread the disease when they are shedding the virus in their feces. It is also spread by the respiratory tract from mouth or respiratory secretions (such as from saliva on hands or toys). The virus has also been found in the fluid from the skin blisters. The infection is spread most easily during the acute phase/stage of illness when people are feeling ill, but the virus can be spread for several weeks after the onset of infection.

The symptoms are much like a common cold with a rash

The rash appears as blisters or ulcers in the mouth, on the inner cheeks, gums, sides of the tongue, and as bumps or blisters on the hands, feet, and sometimes other parts of the skin. The skin rash may last for 7 to 10 days.

There is no specific treatment for the virus that causes hand, foot, and mouth disease

Help prevent and control the spread of hand, foot, and mouth disease by:

- Washing hands well, especially after going to the bathroom, changing diapers and/or handling diapers or other stool-soiled material.
- Covering the mouth and nose when coughing or sneezing.
- Washing toys and other surfaces that have saliva on them.
- Excluding children from child care or school settings if the child has a fever, uncontrollable "hand to mouth" behavior, not able to contain their secretions, such as ulcers in the mouth and the child is drooling, or draining sores that cannot be covered.
